## COPYRIGHT LAW AS IT PERTAINS TO COLLEGES

## Single copies:

An instructor may make a single copy of the following for scholarly research or use in teaching or preparation to teach a class:

- A chapter from a book
- An article from a periodical or newspaper.
- A short story
- A chart, graph, diagram, drawing, cartoon, or picture


## Multiple copies:

One copy per student in a class may be made providing:
I. Brevity and spontaneity tests are met

- brevity: a complete article, story, or essay of less than 2,500 words or an excerpt of less that 1,000 words (or $10 \%$ total of the work, whichever is less) but greater than 500 words or a single chart, graph, drawing, cartoon, or picture per book or magazine
- spontaneity: the decision to use the work comes so close to the moment of use (for maximum teaching effect) that it is unreasonable to get permission. (Example: to clarify an unexpected question brought up in one class copies of an article may be brought to the next)
II. Cumulative effect is not broken
- the copy is used only in one course
- no more than one work from the same author, nor more than three works from a collection or magazine may be used during a single semester.
- there shall be no more than nine instances per course per semester.
III. Each copy must include a copyright notice.


## Exclusions from the above:

I. Copies shall not replace the purchase of books, reprints, or periodicals.
II. The same item shall not be repeatedly copied from semester to semester.
III. Items intended to be "consumed" (workbooks, exercises, test booklets, etc.) shall not be copied.
